He has been extremely successful in obtaining funding for and in coordinating the government contract work in support of upgrading the Automated Systems Approach to Training (ASAT) database. His efforts have resulted in the complete revision of all of the Infantry School's ARTEP Mission Training Plans used by Soldiers around the world, both in training and in actual combat operations.

As the CATD coordinator for International Programs, Mr. [REDACTED] has distinguished himself by the meticulous attention to detail that he has shown in arranging and managing the Infantry School's participation in high-level bilateral staff talks with various allied nations. His efforts as the US National Representative to the Urban Operations Quadripartite Working Party were recognized by military representatives of the Canadian, British, and Australian armies as being key to the successful completion of the Coalition Operations Handbook. This handbook is a major step forward towards truly integrated coalition operations around the world. Without Mr. [REDACTED]'s calm insightful and dedicated guidance, this step would not have been completed.

Mr. [REDACTED] has just accomplished another in a long string of successful bilateral staff talks with the completion of the US/Canadian talks here at Fort Benning, Georgia. His dedication and service to nation and the Army, in time of peace as well as war, has set the example for others. He exemplifies the Infantry School's famous motto: Follow Me!
